DCLG Communities Fund

The Department for Communities and Local Government recently launched a £2.5million Communities Fund to support community-led initiatives. The Fund will target grassroots organisations working in partnership to support people who are struggling to manage – including the long term unemployed, victims of domestic abuse, and the provision of services for disabled children – depending on local need. Groups will be able to apply for grants of £70,000 or more, and will also be supported with expert advice and training.
