





Coronavirus: Obviously the Government's announcement on 16th March has significant implications for the parish and its residents. The Parish Council want to make sure that all our residents get the help they need to get through the issues caused by the Coronavirus. We know that lots of you have already offered to help your neighbours, and we want to make sure that you get supported, and that no-one gets missed.

Our aim is to make sure that every household has a specific person or persons that they can contact if they need help with essential things like food or prescriptions. It is likely that people who are currently helping, may at some stage have to self-isolate, and we also need cover for those people.

We will also be able to act as a central point of contact with other agencies who are already reaching out to provide support and provide the latest information and guidance. Parish Council Meetings: Meetings will continue for the time being, if sufficient Councillors are available to attend meetings. Legally we need to meet face to face in a public place and we will work around illness and isolations as best we can. Our next meeting in April is our Annual Parish Meeting, our current plan is to run this as normal although we understand many will not be able to attend.

Flood Prevention: There has been some progress on flood prevention. Plans are now in place to address the run-off from the Compton Buildings site, hopefully this can still be completed. Our thanks to District Councillor Nigel Rock for his work on this. Also, there are plans to jet a number of blocked culverts and drains before the end of the month.

Clerk Vacancy: Unfortunately, the Parish Clerk, Ian Wilson, has tendered his resignation. The role is largely home based, about 32 hours a month, and would suit someone who is well-organised, good with people and able to work independently. For more information contact the Chair, details above.



NAPTON AND FENNY COMPTON WARD STRATFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

Water Under the Bridge: I have continued to follow up on this issue. Homes England, the owner of the old Compton Buildings site, and WCC Highways met on 11th March and are proposing to carry out some groundworks on the site to prevent major flows of water onto the highway, hopefully around early April. There is to be subsequent additional investigations involving BT Open Reach for the water coming out the telecoms chamber. These will be interim solutions until the site is finally developed for housing. The timing is unknown currently but I will continue to keep the pressure up on everyone involved.

Council Budget: The District Council determined its budget in February resulting in an increase in Council Tax of 3.59%. For a band D property this means that the District Council element rises from £139.12 to £144.12.

Stratford also collects the Council Tax for Warwickshire County Council which is a 3.99% increase, the Police Commissioner a 4.38% increase and Parish Councils. By the time these are added up the band D tax comes to £1870.99 to be paid annually. Bigger or smaller houses pay more or less according to the A-H band rating.

Individual Parishes set their own tax levels, which are called 'precepts'. So, depending where you live, there might be another amount to add to the figure above, which generally varies from zero - outside villages or for small hamlets - to just over £80 for a larger village. In the case of Fenny Compton it is £69.05, a reduction of 3.3% on last year.

At the budget debate I spoke in support of three particular elements, one of which was passed and two were not. I supported the 'ring fencing' of income from business rates from green energy schemes for expenditure on climate change related expenditure. I also wished to see a one-off grant to the Citizens Advice Bureau. Although this grant would nominally add 0.3% to this year's budget, evidence shows that CAB activities are often self-funding by helping vulnerable persons becoming less dependent on benefits. Both items were voted down by the ruling group. I also supported the inclusion of continued improvement in rural transport for those areas not well served by public transport, but requested the existing arrangements be reviewed to get better service for this area. This was agreed.

Introduction of Charges for Collecting Green Waste: At the Council meeting, I seconded a motion to defer the introduction of these charges because I felt neither the financial nor environmental case had been made. Since the previous Council meeting, two windfalls have been received that exceeded expected income and the full (three year) 'settlement' from central Government is not due until July. To me, it seems sensible to delay until the full financial picture is clear as the extra money that has come in is already much more than the projected savings for next year. For a resident who has one bin, a £40 charge is equivalent to making the Stratford Council tax rise more than 30%. Our proposal to defer and review the introduction of charges was voted down by the ruling administration.

HS2: After receiving a complaint and concerns about the future potential for traffic through villages I have approached HS2 contractor Eiffage Kier. I had spoken to them a few months ago about this and I am pleased to say they are presently trialling a system to track vehicles. Please note down any registration numbers of problem vehicles and report them to the HS2 help line 08081 434 434.

Coronavirus: Some news on District Council activity around the Coronavirus outbreak. Council functions are working normally but many staff are working from home where they can. All Council meetings, starting with the Planning Meeting that was due recently, have been postponed. This might delay a very few planning applications that were due to be considered by committees. Work is going on to enable remote meetings to take formal decisions - this is not presently allowed by the law.

A number of actions are in process on business rates to help local businesses as follows. Businesses in the retail, leisure and hospitality sectors including hotels, restaurants and coffee bars with a rateable value of less than £51,000 will not pay business rates in 2020/2021. The discount that pubs receive on their business rates will increase from £1,000 to £5,000, as long as their rateable value is below £100,000. Business rate bills have been issued at zero or with the £5000 reduction where appropriate. All businesses currently eligible for small business rate relief, will receive a one-off grant of £3,000.

There are new announcements coming out every day. I express my personal thank to individuals and communities that are showing great mutual support in these difficult times. If you feel I can help, please contact me.

FARNBOROUGH 1535 – THE PLAGUE ARRIVES

To me the spring of 2020 feels like a phoney war as we watch the apparently inexorable spread of the Coronavirus from places that we do not know to places that we do and, probably, shortly from people that we do not know to people that we do. Today our faith is firmly placed in science, modern medicine and mathematical modelling, but things were very different in the Middle Ages when plagues swept backwards and forwards across Europe, changing the outcome of wars, inconveniencing the travel plans of the rich and killing indiscriminately.

I have found few traces of plague in the archives, but there are two letters about what was obviously a serious outbreak in Farnborough in 1535. To set the scene, in 1535 Henry VIII was on the throne, Anne Boleyn was nearing the end of her life, five Carthusian monks from London's Chaterhouse were hung drawn and quartered and Cardinal Fisher beheaded for refusing to accept Henry VIII as the head of the Church of England and Thomas Cromwell, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Master of the Rolls and Visitor General of the Monasteries, was in the ascendant.

In Farnborough health, rather than politics, must have been the most immediate concern, as a letter of 22nd February reports that George Raleigh, Lord of the Manor... "was on Wednesday 'enoyled' likely not to escape the disease. His wife and five or six of his servants have died of it. I write now for fear of writing too late." The 22nd was a Friday, so George had received the Catholic sacrament of Extreme Unction two days before the letter was sent. The picture is of a devastating outbreak in one household in the village, but where there are six or seven victims and the Lord dying in one household, it is hard to believe that there were not other cases in the village, unremarked, because irrelevant to the purposes of the writer. The second letter is more positive, being written on the 19th February 1536 by George Raleigh himself, following a remarkable and unexpected recovery.

So, what are these letters? Perhaps unsurprisingly, they are not political, but nor are they health-related, rather they are both unashamedly economic in motive, aiming to build or protect fortunes. In the first, John Wellysburn writes to Thomas Cromwell to ask the King for the wardship of the heir of George Raleigh, who is described as "a man of 300 marks of land and more". There was money to be made from a wealthy ward. But Wellysburn was on the make and did not stop with this relatively innocuous request, moving on to openly propose a broader business relationship with Cromwell, namely that they share equally anything that Cromwell can persuade the King to give him. Wellysburn was clearly aspiring to a wealthy future, perhaps unlike his past: while an ambassador to France in 1530 he complained that if he had to stay there longer, he would need to be given more money for additional clothes. Cromwell's position clearly gave him the power to arrange wealth and Wellysburn, through his involvement in raiding religious institutions in 1529 as a King's Commissioner, may have had the correct idea about the fortunes that would be made from the coming expropriations of Church lands.

Raleigh's letter is also one pleading for Cromwell's assistance. While Wellysburn thought Raleigh's estates extensive enough to bother about, Raleigh himself tells Cromwell that a large part of his income - £60 from lands in Warwickshire and Gloucestershire and £40 from Ireland - came to him through his dead wife's first husband, Sir Thomas Fitzgarethe, and that with her death they now descended to Sir James, Sir Thomas' brother and heir. The question is simple: could Cromwell write to Sir James, asking for the incomes during his lifetime?

We do not know the outcome of the second request to Cromwell, but Raleigh was hardly a pauper and quickly got married again and well to Anne Ernley, of the powerful Wiltshire family, from whom he seems to have received estates in Wiltshire and the Isle of Wight. He then settled down to the normal role of the gentry locally to his estates in Wiltshire, Warwickshire and Oxfordshire, but he also provided troops, 16 infantry, to Henry's war effort against France in the early 1540s. It is very likely that some, at least, of these men were from his estates in Farnborough, Avon Dassett, Mollington and Claydon, They may well have been involved in the siege of Boulogne in 1544, as they are recorded as receiving wages in that year, and, if so, they could have had another brush with the plague in Boulogne, where following the English victory, the 1,200 labourers who were shipped in in January 1545 to refortify the town were reduced, through sickness and death, to just 300 by June.

This method requires no skill from the criminal and can be done with almost no noise and therefore not alerting residents or neighbours. This method can be used on Euro Lock Cylinders which are typically fitted in UPVC, composite and aluminium doors. LETTER FROM THE VICARAGE

At the beginning of March, I attended the last service to be held at Knightcote Methodist church. Over the last few years, I have had the pleasure of worshiping with this church community and I was very sad to find that it was closing. Closing a church is a tragic, heart-breaking and deeply sad phenomenon. At the moment, we do not hear much about the closing of churches, but I fear that soon this will become a regular phenomenon. Churches are not only sacred places where people have worshiped for generations but are also often beautiful, old, historical, and hugely important buildings. In my opinion, churches closing are only really acceptable when they result from people completely abandoning a church but when asked the question why they close, the answer is always the same. Those attending church are slowly dying out and there is no replacement, there is no money to maintain the churches, not enough parishioners to do the organising and administration or the ministers to serve these communities.

You may have a Christian faith but not attend church on a regular basis. Many would like church to be there for special, seasonal, or family services such weddings, christenings, funerals, Christmas etc. But do you realise that for that to happen there needs to be a group of willing parishioners that the funding comes directly from or who fundraise and do all that is necessary to keep the church doors open? This is not done by a central body. It is all done locally!

Local parish churches are independent charities, and the members of the Church Council, the PCC, are trustees. There are many costs involved in operating a parish church, both running costs eg energy bills, .capital costs eg building works, and Parish Share which is a donation by the parish to fund their Vicar. In addition to the church services we are involved in activities in the school which include a weekly assembly alternating between our children's ministry team leading Open the Book and me the Vicar, running Fenny Compton Tots & Toddlers; Just-a-Bite lunches; Lego Club in Northend and helping run Farnborough Teas, to name a few of our activities.

I would like to thank those of you who already support the churches financially and actively but, sadly, we need more help to save us from following in the shoes of Knightcote Methodist church.



FENNY COMPTON FOOTPATH GROUP

In February the plan was to replace a rotten wooden bridge on the footpath to Farnborough at the Parish boundary then have our annual winter breakfast, but storm Dennis was forecast so we postponed for a week. Storm Dennis was not that big a deal locally, but the following Sunday started cold and wet. The new wooden bridges are supplied in kit form by Warwickshire County Council; to assemble it you drill holes and bolt it together. This one was 3.6 metres long and is not a full bridge but a 'ditch crossing' which is simpler, open rather than stile ended and only has a single handrail. The first part of the job was to transport it to the site from my house. Moving it along The Slade in my van was easy enough but then we had to carry it about 500 metres along a soggy headland in the rain. The 4 main rails are the heaviest part; two people are needed to carry each one. After many trips up and down we had the kit at the site including two 20kg bags of concrete and all the tools. The old bridge was removed. We assembled the new one then fixed it in position. We aim to finish by noon, and I thought we would have an early finish, but we were only finished by 1 o'clock so we postponed the breakfast until next time. It was the first major project we have done for a long time, but it felt like most of the effort went into getting the bridge to the site and taking the old one away. I am still aching 3 days later. It was hard work and we had earned the breakfast, but it will have to wait until March.

AQUEOUS

There has been some positive progress to report this month. Firstly, some fallen Willow trees downstream of the surgery have been cleared reducing any back up and ensuring the watercourse flows out of the village without restriction. Secondly, following reports to Aqueous by residents, the County Council will be undertaking investigation, jetting and cleaning work in Memorial Road and Bridge Street to clear the drains and culverts.

We have also been working with Cllr Nigel Rock to investigate the surface water flooding around the surgery. The surface water design within the Ridge Way development itself seem to operate as designed. The source of the problem is associated with the ditch alongside and behind Cotters Croft which has an inadequate outlet which results in flooding during heavy rainfall. Liability for this remains uncertain and is being investigated further. Once this is established options for resolution can be developed.

A further meeting with the County Council has been set up for April so hopefully there will be further developments to report next month.


