Parish Council Meetings: The meeting arranged for 6th April was cancelled due to the Coronavirus lockdown and online meeting arrangements not being approved by Government in time for the meeting. The intention is to rearrange the meeting and possibly hold it together with a rearranged May meeting. However, the meeting will be online rather than face to face but will be open to the public to join in. The following report is from the March meeting.

Policing and Crime: A public liaison meeting was held on 11th March in The Reading Room. A future event is planned for Friday 15th May at 7pm; this, however, is dependent on the lockdown situation. In addition, a representative of the Police will try to be present at each of the monthly coffee mornings when they resume.

Burial Ground & Cemetery Car Park: New locks have now been fitted and the fencing replaced in the car park. Contact details for the Cemetery Warden will be included on the back of *The Compton Chronicle*.

Playground: The gatepost has now been replaced and discussions are ongoing as to who should repair the area around the access gate.

The Yew Tree is currently closed due to the Coronavirus lockdown. However, the Management Committee is still meeting, using conference calling, to ensure that when the current restrictions are lifted, the pub can reopen as soon as possible. All events and bookings have been cancelled or postponed until further notice.

The report below relates to March as no report was published last month

On Thursday 20th February The Yew Tree hosted the newly married Mike and Liz Blakeman and their guests for their wedding reception. The pub was transformed by Liz's brother and celebrity florist Simon Lycett and the huge flower arch around the doorway became a major discussion point. Thanks go to our tenants Colin Payne and Steve Jones for their commitment to making the event happen and to their enthusiastic staff who helped the celebrations to be so successful. It is hoped that the success of this event will encourage others to consider using The Yew Tree as a venue for their events. Photographs showing the transformation are available on The Yew Tree website and on Facebook.

Before the lockdown, menus had been changed in response to customer feedback and happy hour had been reinstated.

For the last quiz we had a stand in Quizmaster who introduced some new themed rounds into proceedings. The jackpot was not won and is expected to continue to build once we can start the quiz again. The Bridge Club and Walking Groups have been popular but have had to be suspended. They will be reinstated as soon as possible.

NAPTON AND FENNY COMPTON WARD STRATFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

Coronavirus. It seems amazing that the last report I wrote for *The Chronicle* made no mention of Covid19, but since then I have done little else. Both the Council and I have been very busy, and this report is all about Coronavirus activity. The Council has had a key role to play in emergency responses and I will try to summarise a few of the things that have been going on.

The Council has set priorities during the coronavirus crisis:

- Protecting residents, staff, and Councillors from coronavirus
- Maintaining business critical services
- Maintaining the decision-making capability of the Council
- Support to businesses through the rapid processing of the reliefs and grants to business
- Support to the vulnerable, and the "shielded" within our communities

Council Tax Bills and Leaflet: The Coronavirus emergency actions came into being just after the Council Tax bills were sent out. This timing was unfortunate especially for those that have lost income as a result of the emergency. If anyone has difficulty in paying the bill, please note that the Council is not taking enforcement action against failure to pay at the moment, but if you can afford to pay, please do – the Council is under severe financial pressure. Accompanying the bill was a leaflet explaining the proposed green waste charges. For those of us that campaigned against the introduction of the charge, we now find that a virus less than a micron in diameter has achieved what we did not - and the charge has been deferred for at least a year.

Who knows what the future holds, as Government finances – including local Government - will be an area of difficulty for years to come? To date the Government has provided £43,508 of financial support. However, the estimated cost through increased expenditure and reduced revenue is estimated to be in the region of £4-5m. In relation to additional emergency related expenditure the Council has incurred costs of around £100,000.

Operation of the Council: I am pleased to report that that the Council – staff, management and Councillors of all parties are working together in a collaborative and effective manner for the community. Legislation and Council rules are in the process of being revised to allow some decisions to be taken by remote working - such as video conferencing when technological facilities can be established. This is not easy, and we want to ensure that democratic control and oversight is not lost. Planning committees are a good example where it is important that there is scope for such oversight.

The Council is very much open for business by phone and email and continues to receive above average call volumes, but the Council offices are closed for personal visits.

Key services being maintained include:

• Environmental Protection; Food Safety

- Benefits Housing and Council Tax with significant increase in demand
- Homelessness/Rough Sleepers/Housing Officers
- Legal services; Licensing
- Refuse and Recycling
- Planning

Due to the need to comply with social distancing arrangements, some services have been temporarily suspended such as UBUS, public toilets, & Land Charge searches.

Refuse, Recycling & Green Waste: Currently the Council can maintain all of the refuse and recycling collections. However residents may have heard Warwick have had to suspend their garden waste service. Whilst this is being maintained by BIFFA, if staffing levels drop in the future then this service may need to be suspended by Stratford-on-Avon District Council.

Elections: In line with the instruction from central Government, the election for the Police and Crime Commissioner on 6^{th} May 2020 has been cancelled.

Support to the Vulnerable: This has been an area of partnership working across County, District and Parishes. The establishment of so many local volunteers to support individuals within communities has been important for many of our residents.

In addition, there has been the implementation of the Shielded Hubs in partnership with the County Council. Those who have been identified as the "extremely vulnerable" – those who have been/are being contacted by the NHS and must not leave their homes for a 12-week period. Nationally, there were 900,000 individuals, and the District Council has been undertaking food deliveries for individuals with no current arrangements in place from a newly established distribution hub which has been set up at Stratford. To date the Council has made nearly 300 food deliveries. There is a helpline 0800 408 1447 which is open 24/7 for individuals to call if they need support. What has not been working well is the national coordination with supermarkets and I have struggled to resolve a number of cases with home deliveries for the vulnerable.

Enforcing the Regulations: The Council's Environmental Health department is leading the compliance of regulations at businesses. The Police lead on enforcing Government guidance on individuals and groups. In the first week, the Food Safety team contacted over 400 food businesses by telephone, email and leaflet drop, to advise them of the new business closure rules. The Council has issued posters for display on practical measures on social distancing to smaller food retailers on customer social distancing. Additionally, area surveys have been carried out in daytime and evening by officers to identify any business that were open illegally. The Council has investigated 31 reports of complaints about businesses not complying with the law and served two Prohibition Notices on businesses that had remained open in contravention of the regulations.

Support to Businesses: There are two schemes currently proposed:

Scheme 1 – Business Support Grants Fund: Properties in receipt of rural rate relief or small business rates relief on 11^{th} March, will be eligible for a grant payment of £10,000. There are some exceptions.

Scheme 2 – Retail, Hospitality and Leisure Business Grants Fund: Properties which would have qualified for retail discount on 11^{th} March, will be entitled to between £10,000 and £25,000 depending on rateable value. This has been an extremely busy period and I express my thanks to all involved. As well as the applause at the 8pm events for all the support services and workers - the sense of community spirit has been heart-warming in many ways.

THE PESTILENCE 1596

Around the time it became clear that the Covid-19 epidemic had reached England I happened to read Thomas Nashe's poem and from there was lead to some recent research on the Castilian plague of 1596 which was typical of the plagues that he had in mind and which had swept Europe, including this country, since the 14th century. There are major differences between these plagues and the Covid-19 epidemic; in particular they caused a much higher death rate because they spread unchecked in towns and there was no realistic treatment let alone palliative care. On the other hand, they spread much less outside towns and seaports and Fenny Compton, as a small inland village, may hardly have felt their impact. Monarchs and governments dreaded their arrival in their capitals with good reason and during the Castilian plague the Spanish king and his court basically kept on the move until they thought it was safe to stop. Then as now there were acts of courage and unselfish sacrifice by some people which were applauded while others panicked or were blindly self-centred. And the plague cost the government huge amounts of revenue, which it had effectively already spent, so there were serious economic consequences that lasted for years. In short, what we are experiencing now is another serious bit of history that, like the Castilian plague, will make its way into the history books of the future.

My poem may seem a bit depressed but Nashe was in complete despair; the other verses of his poem all emphasize the haphazard and sadistic cruelty of the plague. In a way our feelings are a measure of the difference that 400 years has made.

THE PESTILENCE J R Peers

This pushy and unwelcome visitor creates a fever Of excitement like a fox appearing in a chicken run, Or when a recognised seducer smirks their way Into a teenage party; pulses and expectations race. The old identify a time that they dislike; The springtime flowers prematurely fade, The opera goes on too long and trips to India And Italy promising warmth, indulgence and escape From time's slow march, must be delayed. Our only champions - actively unglamorous Scientists in suits, and wooden ministers and mayors With earnest clipboard frowns and stilted diction. The club we've joined advises we expect a lengthy stay With shrinking funds, distress and possible extinction.

So far it's been a phoney war whose real cruelties Have been inflicted somewhere else; and so, like soldiers Marching to the front, we're talking sense and balancing The odds. Do we succeed in packaging the swift irrelevance Of beauty, wit, possessions, past success, courage And even love? Or does the fox untie our brains Before he does the business? Is it remotely sane To buy those crates of bogroll, beans and soup? 70 years back our fear of nuclear war could just Be soothed by tinned sardines and powdered milk, Secreted In the roof; much later found and binned By mocking children and bemused executors. A nervous whine greets each defensive stratagem, Pointing its quivering finger at the obvious Mistakes and all the horrors sure to follow. Kipling would sigh at manliness so hollow.

The town is greatly changed, the streets perversely quiet Except where 'supermarket' stores, last month so firmly Calm and deeply stocked, must gasp for breath While from their doors, with all the vigour of a plague Of angry ants, their wild-eyed shoppers drag huge Bulging bags away. The little shops now look as if Their former confidence will soon be turned to dust

And spread across their bare abandoned counters. A 16th century plague could only kill and leave; This modern plague may well be cheated of your life And take your livelihood instead. A brightly coloured blanket Of apparent cash descends to shield our shivering world And we are asked to trust that such a contrast to the usual Miserly restraint is just a sign of strength. We hesitate To guess what we will find when finally the blanket floats away And we can see what little has survived to face the day.

But when our visitor departs his grand destructive Triumph will be compromised by pleasures which He accidentally sired. For children, school at home Restores to them the proper custody of their education. Plenty of 'art', insane dislike of screens abandoned, And teachers grateful – finally – for their pupils' generous Participation. Outside the birds and bees observe That garden productivity is being usefully improved; The sheep observe that footpath walkers have a strange Good humour and, from a certain distance, smile incessantly At lambs and other humans, as if in sudden love With every living thing. Are they unwell? Or is the lack Of traffic in the sky above making them all so debonair? We'll never understand; last night they stood outside Their homes and clapped and clapped the chilly evening air.

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


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

LETTER FROM THE VICARAGE

We are living in unprecedented times. None of us have experienced anything like this before. There are some who said that the closing down of so much of our daily life was unnecessary and simply scaremongering and causing panic. Others that we did not do this early enough. We stay at home to safeguard and protect the elderly and vulnerable groups in our society - those most liable to catch the Coronavirus - to reduce the pressure on our NHS.

I have been overwhelmed by the care and concern there has been for those having to totally self-isolate whilst the rest of us can go out for a daily walk or weekly shop. Jesus said, 'Love thy neighbour' and 'Care for those in need.' That is exactly what we have seen. People helping those in our communities, not just their friends but people that previously they did not know by sight or name. A new strong feeling of community has emerged. The support groups and networks that have been set up are amazing.

But whilst the majority of us have been 'locked down' others with essential jobs have continued to go out to work to provide what we need to stay at home.

Those in food shops, factories, farmers, delivery drivers who ensure that food and our essentials are available for us. Those who keep our utilities going so that we may comfortably and safely live in our homes. Providing all the amenities and things we are used to including our IT, broadband and media which has kept us in touch and entertained and allowed so many to work from home. Each Thursday evening millions of us up and down the country take to our doorsteps to say 'Thank you' to frontline staff - doctors, nurses, care workers, supermarket staff, the emergency services and teachers.

As I write this we have just been told we have yet another 3 weeks of 'lockdown' ahead of us and even then it may not be over! Whilst ironically the sun keeps shining, it all seems quite bleak as we adjust to our new realities; of being confined at home together 24/7, home-schooling children, working from home, being laid off from work, living alone in isolation, feel financial strain during the uncertainty. As all this goes on people are becoming critically ill and dying as a result of the virus - even the young, fit and healthy.

I would like to share the closing words from a recent *Call the Midwife.* "*The seasons will always turn. It rains and we ford across the floods, the drought comes, and we manage that too. We survive them, we grow regardless of the weather. This too will pass. We will know wonder where there has been despair. There will be happiness in this time, and we will remember it. There will be friendships which we won't forget. Love is the constant whereby we endure all - all winters and all storms. It's the time in which all things can thrive. The darkness is like a canopy from which the stars can hang. For there are always stars, we just need to look for them."*

I have come to realise that everyone of us is a star that can shine in the darkness to lighten the path of others and even ourselves if we choose to.

Each with our place each with our purpose as fixed as the familiar constellations. The stars are shinning throughout our communities, their "light shines in the darkness". May these feelings and action to be community... to help one another continue when this time has passed. Keep yourselves, your families and your neighbours safe. God bless you all.

CHURCH SERVICES - NEW DIGITAL CHURCH

As we face a time of challenge, where prayer, worship and fellowship with others feels increasingly important, we find any plans to gather together as a worshipping community are on hold, due to social distancing and self-isolation. It started with all public worship in groups being cancelled and then the church buildings were locked. Many people were asking.... 'How do we keep our faith strong in this time and how, if we find ourselves in isolation, do we maintain a rhythm of prayer and worship?'

Whilst we are '*locked in*' to our homes we are '*locked out*' of our churches, but church is not closed it has changed. Many churches chose to record services or livestream using YouTube, Facebook, and other media. But many of these do not allow live interaction between the participants. I wanted to hold services that would allow us to talk to and see one another in the same way we do when face to face in church. I therefore set up our new Digital Church using the ZOOM conferencing service. This has allowed the church community to gather together for worship and a much need chance to chat and socialise in the safety of our own homes.

We have a fully interactive service in the same way we would in a service held in the church. The words for the service and hymns are projected on the screen and people switch their microphones on and off as they join in to read the bible, say prayers and lead us as we sing to live music. The music for singing was initially very distorted until we discovered the 'original sound' button now our piano and vocal accompaniment makes singing so good that we are having a very uplifting twice weekly 'Songs of Praise' every Wednesday and Sunday evening - email me your hymn requests.

Our first Digital Church service was on Mothering Sunday and we have had 2 services a day ever since. The service 'attendance' has been 50 to 60 on Sunday morning and 12 to 16 at each of the two daily services and it has allowed families from all over the country to meet and worship together. We have had family members from Birmingham, Yorkshire, Wales, London, Surrey and elsewhere – it is amazing. The worship is sandwiched between a pre and post chat often with a coffee or glass of wine in hand! It seems to be bringing a routine to people's day giving a spiritual and much needed social connection. If you have not already done so, join us at Digital Church. We recognise the psychological impact this is going to have on people, both close family, and friends. Whilst we do not pretend that we can wave the proverbial magic wand and make everything better, we would like to be able to support families to change their mindset about how to have a fitting send off, pay respects, celebrate a life, or whatever label most appropriately suits the occasion. Slowly, without the rules the virus has beset on us, we have gradually been moving away from traditional funerals, by having the option of a direct type cremation, followed by an event at a later date. In the past this has meant that people travelling some distance for the funeral have been able to comfortably make arrangements, and choices of the most fitting venue and food selected. The current situation has thrust this alternative into the forefront as an acceptable option, and hopefully a way in which family and friends can hold a memorial, pay respects or celebrate a life, whilst feeling that they have suitably and correctly dealt with the loss of a loved one. They will feel they have said their farewells and goodbyes in a fitting manner. At Mid-England Barrow we are now taking booking for funerals or celebrations of life from June onwards. We have a 5* registered kitchen, and all the necessary food hygiene certification. Anyone is welcome to hold a funeral here, and if in June we are still governed by restrictions, we will gladly allow you to rearrange your event without any costs incurred. FENNY COMPTON FOOTPATH GROUP

We went into April under very unusual circumstances due to the Covid-19 restrictions. Our Group work sessions are on hold for a while, but we still have lots of jobs to do and the people to do them. Major projects are on hold for now but some of the volunteers will be out doing the tasks that only need one person to do them. The working as a team approach has worked very well; we will just have to see how the next weeks or months develop.

We are now into our 23rd year and stronger than ever; we had 3 more people join us last year and we are pretty much on top of things. I have been thinking about what impact the Footpath Group has had. Obviously, the paths and bridleways are in much better shape and, especially in the current circumstances, there are far more people using them. There are worse places to be in lockdown or working from home. Despite the success of the Footpath Group we have had no problems with litter, vandalism or thefts from farms due to the footpaths. There are still people straying from the footpaths and wandering around where they shouldn't but all we can do is to mark the official routes as clearly as we can. One downside of our work though is that there may appear to have been an impact on wildlife. There used to be active badger setts in Fenny Compton, Farnborough and Avon Dassett and now all of the badgers have gone. The setts were on the routes of footpaths so perhaps they have moved to more secluded places. Deer and hares are also not so common as are rabbits but that may be more to do with the RVHD disease which is wiping out the rabbit population everywhere.

Nobody knows how or when Covid-19 will end so we carry on individually and wait and see.

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A LOAD OF OLD RUBBISH

On Easter Monday me and my daughter Hannah walked three quarters of a mile along Northend Road and collected approximately 20kg of rubbish from the hedgerows and ditches. The picture shows four bulging bags of the litter and rubbish we collected. Where does all this come from? Well, sadly some of it seems to be deliberately dumped - McDonald's bags, cans of drinks with drinks still in them,



cigarette packets and new, shiny cans that once contained Red Bull and the like. But mostly we picked up old crisp and sweet packets, old bottles and cans, plastic containers all the sorts of things that would normally be put into our rubbish or recycling bins. So - does this rubbish get blown out of the bin lorries as they travel from village to village? We were staggered by just how much we collected in such a short distance. Yet only yesterday I saw an empty cake box on top of a grit bin about 15 metres away from the litter bin by the Fenny bus stop - why would anyone just leave it there?

So much of this stuff can cause damage to wildlife. Television reports from earlier in the year raised our awareness of the terrible damage plastic is doing to the world, but we have it here on our doorstep too - we just cannot see it as we drive past in our cars. So a plea: if you see rubbish on the ground and are near a bin, please pick up the rubbish and put it in that bin. If you see rubbish on the ground but are not near a bin - pick it up and take it home to bin. Fenny is a lovely village with many community groups working hard to keep it a great place to live - we can all do a little bit to keep our environment clean by simply being more aware of how we dispose of our rubbish. If, at the time of reading, lockdown is continuing, I hope we shall have walked to Northend village and back and cleared the ditches and hedgerows either side of the road completely of litter. But, hey – it is not an exclusive activity - anyone can do it!!


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
