



The Council meeting took place by videoconference on Monday 3rd August. John Feilding, our District Councillor also attended.

Playground: The playground is open but despite notices stating that no food is allowed, it was noted that people have been picnicking. All users are asked to adhere to the rules and all members of the community are requested to help to uphold the rules

Green Areas: Enquiries are being made to take over responsibility for the maintenance of the graveyard at the side of St John's Church from Stratford District Council. The graveyard is overgrown and cannot be mowed. The wall is bulging and there is a large gap which has appeared which is giving cause for concern. Photographs have been sent to the District Council and the Church Commissioners.

Roads and Drains: The roads in the village have been marked up for repair. It was agreed with the landowner that the hedge and verge on Church Hill will be cut back as soon as possible after the bird nesting season has finished. Hopefully in September.

Coronavirus Volunteer Group: The helpline is still available.

Reading Room: A cleaner has been appointed to clean the premises once a month. Apart from the Post Office operation, the Reading Room remains closed until Government restrictions are lifted.

Napton and Fenny Compton Ward Stratford District Council

As some people may know, I suffered a heart attack on 16th July. I would like to thank the very many people who have expressed get well messages towards me in various forms since then. I owe a great to debt to the NHS and, in particular, St Wulfstan Surgery in Southam, the emergency ambulance service and UHCW/Walsgrave Hospital.

Rapid intervention and excellent care appears to have averted substantial damage and I understand my prospects for recovery are good, but this will take a little time. Messages of support have come from many directions across communities and the local government and political spectrum.

The leader of the Lib Dem Group Dr Susan Juned has arranged cover for District Council matters. My colleague Louis Adam, the District Councillor for the adjoining ward of Long Itchington and Stockton will guide you with any queries where he can. Other councillors nearby have also offered to help out for the time being. I am so grateful for these offers.

In the midst of my own difficulties, I was most distressed to hear that County Councillor Bob Stevens had died unexpectedly.

I have known Bob for about 24 years, living in adjoining villages well before I was elected. For a time he was my County Councillor while I was his District Councillor. During my first eight years as a District Councillor, he was also a District Councillor, and we occasionally shared lifts to meetings and planning site visits. Although we were in different political parties our views and interests often aligned in getting the best for our part of the world in the east of Stratford District. When I was first elected, we successfully worked together as a team to constrain excessive quarrying around Stockton. Over the years, we both did our best to resist and make the best of HS2, I as a former Parliamentary candidate and Bob latterly in a formal role at the County.

Since May 2019, our areas of representation overlapped, with about 65% of my ward falling with Bob's County Division. We saw one another every few weeks at the Parish Council meetings for Fenny Compton, Ladbroke, Wormleighton, Priors Hardwick and Priors Marston parishes. Quite often, issues crossed County and District responsibility areas such as speed limits and flooding around new developments and we collaborated to address these, speaking on the phone most weeks.

Although he had been ill on and off for a while, just lately he had seemed somewhat better. He told me he had been having some problems with his circulatory system. He approached that with humour. Having been a Royal Navy engineering officer he told me he asked the medics if they could not just flush the pipework out a bit.

On the weekend of his death, I phoned round the village Parish Councils where we shared responsibility. Whilst not easy for me with my own situation as I recover

from a heart attack, it was something I wanted to do as we have worked together for those communities over the past 15 months or so. The feedback from there and elsewhere was, of course, reflective of the esteem in which he was held - a gentlemen with a long service to the community.

LETTER FROM THE VICARAGE

So much has changed and no I am not talking about COVID-19 although that has had a great impact. I am talking about my brother-in-law Doug who had a severe stroke in late January and the impact that has had on both him and my sister-in-law Stella. It has taken a lot of hard physical and emotional work to get them to where they are now. He can now walk - very short distances with a stick but with poor balance. His left arm and hand - his dominant side - are still useless, but he has his speech although his recognition of what is safe and what is not and his short term memory have been affected.

I find it impossible to imagine what it is like for him and Stella, who still has all her physical and mental faculties but has lost her independence and has become a full time carer. She cannot see how she can still be involved in her Gospel choir which rehearses for two hours a week and does regular performances and her drama group which requires a similar commitment. Who will stay with Doug while she does this? The support groups and local charities run by volunteers that would have provided this are not doing so because of social distancing.

Then there is the problem of the home. They live in a little cottage with steps everywhere, a tiny spiral staircase and a 1.2 acre garden with additional paddock and stables. Since he returned home from hospital two weeks before lockdown they have lived in two downstairs rooms. There is no way they can stay there. They must move and find themselves a bungalow with a small garden all on one level. So, life must change further and the comfort of the familiar must be left behind and yet more unknown embraced.

Luckily, they have embraced this, and I have had two visits to help 'house doctor' their home ready for sale. Even that has been painful as they have had to decide what to take and keep and what to get rid of in a time when charity shops are not taking perfectly useable and in many cases much loved items. But on the good side the projected sale price was greatly improved after the 'house doctoring'.

As I think of this and the changes in my life due to lockdown and social distancing. I realise that my changes are temporary. One day - although that day may be a long way off yet - my life will be able to go back to pre-COVID. But there will be things I will miss or am thankful for...

- My husband working from home. That has worked well for both of us and his employer. And I have had the added bonus that with no commute home he chose to take over the cooking he is a good cook but never had time before.
- Zooming our church services has been successful and continues despite now being able to have services in church.
- The increased contact with family on Zoom and FaceTime. Regular chats through the week when before it was visits a few times a year.

• Relationships with family and friends has become more important and a lot of the peripheries that used to be important no longer are.

I think the last few months has made us all reevaluate so much. Perhaps we all need to 'house doctor' our lives. Throw out the old and in some cases, much loved and embrace the new and unknown. To consider the lives of others and become the good neighbour. But let us not forget that there are those in our families and communities whose lives will not revert back, whose lives will have changed forever due to Covid-19 and other things that would have happened anyway. Let us see if we can be there for them and help them to embrace the new and unknown.







Footpath Group. Thanks Jim. It had not run for years and there were a few bits missing. Amazingly, we got the engine running and I got the missing parts for about £20. We sent it out to do some work but it started to leak petrol so we have yet to use it in anger.

I have had requests to install a couple of gates. It used to be that all I had to do was to email or phone my contact at Warwickshire County Council and a new gate would be delivered. Nowadays it is a lot more complicated so if you have contacted



me with a request please bear with me, the new system is painfully slow.

There are about 10 of us in the Group and we meet up every 4th Sunday from 9am to 12noon. The work is not hard or difficult but it is very rewarding and helps to keep the paths in good order. If you like the sound of it

and want to try it out call me. Equipment and on the job training is provided and there is no obligation to be available for every session.




BOWLS CLUB

A THREE SPIRES WALK

A 6 mile walk through three villages, farmland and by lakes links three churches in Fenny Compton, Avon Dassett and Farnborough. Many locals will know most of the paths, but we linked them together to make a circular walk. We started and finished at the Fenny Compton War Memorial although the walk could be started from the centre of Avon Dassett or Farnborough taking about 3½ hours including a breakfast picnic. Parking is available in Memorial Road.







Facing the Memorial walk left to Church Street up to St Peter and St Clare Church through the churchyard out to Dog Lane. Follow to The Slade, turn left past the farmhouse and barns looking for the kissing gate on the right. Take the right fork through the beans (in August), over the stile, along the boundary to the crab apple tree forking left up to the half-dead ash tree. Pass through the hedge gap, left uphill beside the sunflowers. Keep straight on past the ash tree on the right and head for the poplar trees. Follow the field boundary then cross the arable field of wheat to the gap in the tree line across another field to reach the marker post and kissing gate. Over the road and style into a meadow and head for the wooden fence posts round the edge of an old quarry. Leave the fence line towards the metal gate and over another stile. Follow the path through the wooded section - beware brambles and nettles - then through the gateway to the meadow. Walk along the contour parallel to the boundary fence turning sharp right just after electricity pole and over the stile. Go through the gap in the tall conifer hedge and turn immediately left with the tall hedge on your left. Sheltered by the trees walk along a dark stretch to meet the road into Avon Dassett by John the Baptist Church.

Continue downhill into the village taking the left turn into a lane just after the George VI letter box beside St Anne's Cottage. Walk to the Dutch barn turn right and follow the barn wall. Beyond the barn meet a gate and go into pasture to follow the contour for a while to meet a stile with no boundaries!

The path starts to gently climb with views over the Dassett Gap and the M40 towards the scarp of Edge Hill. Follow the path through the gorse bushes eventually meeting a stile in the corner of the pasture. Cross the arable field over a style to pass along a 380m stretch of 2m tall maize down to the road.

Left to Farnborough keeping an eye open for the permissive path on the left just before the brick wall on the right. Follow woodland path to the lake, turn right and walk along the embankment with the lake to your left until you are alongside a surfaced road. Take the gravel path beyond the wooden gate and follow this crossing another road via two more wooden gates. Leaving the gravel path via two stone walls turn left to the village centre.

A short diversion off to the right can be made to St Botolph's Church. Near The Kitchen look for the sunflower sculptures on the house walls on the left and take the signed path beside Chapel Cottage at Heydons Terrace. Over the style into pasture head uphill towards a bush of gorse just visible on the brow of Windmill Hill. Keeping the stone heap on your left go over the brow and head for a gap between two hawthorn trees then downhill to the left of the gorse bushes, bare right to the crab apple tree to find the stile.

Follow the hedge line to the bridge and stiles - another without boundaries - looking for the marker post on the boundary slightly to the right. Over the stile uphill next to the hedge to a marker post to turn right across the crop to a gap in the hedge. Head through the crop to a few treetops to find a kissing gate and bridge. Go uphill across the crops at about 40° to the hedge line (WNW) and then down to another bridge and kissing gate out on to The Slade. Turn left along The Slade down past the farmhouse and through the kissing gates on the right into Hall Yard to walk towards the St Peter and St Clare Church. Go through the two gates to bring you into the churchyard and back onto Church Street and Memorial Road to complete the walk.

The garden area, Surrounded by a barbed wire bramble hedge, is quite A size and popular with birds who sing and fool around, And other animals who pop in overnight and fight And park a crap and vandalise the lilies just like the Good old days. This morning on the grass I found A broken tiny eggshell and I hoped its passenger Had got away in time. It will be grown and singing With the rest before our turn to fly arrives. No pardon seems in sight for our fortuitous crime.

The food is great; you'd think that with the sword Of Damocles so finely poised above our heads Our appetites would wane. No way, no wane. The menus Hit the spot like perfect penalties; forget the fancy Dining of our former life, the chefs awash with Arrogance, the prices off the scale, the oily staff. Here we've had sorrel soup, wild garlic pesto, Perfect steaks, asparagus and salmon, broad beans (Loaded on buttered sourdough, need I say) and, For our tea break, flapjacks, gingerbread and Dundee cake. Our cook's another inmate but she knows her stuff; No stupid virus would attempt to turn her off. The bar and wine list - my concern – are, shall we say, Acceptable in the straitened circumstances of the day.

For exercise there's housework, borne with all the smiling Bonhomie you'd want. Almost no shopping, bar to get My pills; the pharmacists all quiet and smelling sweet as hay, Their masks are double thick; you can't pick up a word they say. We get a proper walk three times a week. We stick To footpaths but the prison anoraks are spotted in a flash And other walkers steer away like we had got the rash. On other days it's garden work. We dig for bloody victory And watch some hired hand enjoy the ride-on mower. My beans got done by mice and two nights freaking Frost arrived in May – so half my spuds were lost.

Till last week visitors verboten. Now they've got a scheme Which lets a brace of inmates from some other clink Enjoy a soiree in our yard. We know them all too well, But strange to say the wit and wisdom fairly flow. These odd conditions make you realise you've no idea What's really in their heads or even in your own. The news we hear is somehow never plain. Our leaders, Rightly anxious, serve a regular and wholesome diet Of mainly positives. Their critics and the thirsty choir Of scribes, a few at least of which have good intentions, Swoop like excited rats on failures, muddles and excuses As they obligingly emerge, withering with scorn, Dismay and cutting pity - excepting carefully the heroes Cast for sainthood - the variegated and distinctly weary army On which our lives depend. In our profession reticence On others' failures is a stronger inclination.

The weeks stroll by, kicking us on the ankles as they pass; We are unharmed but time is stolen from us every day. News from our families pounds impatiently at our ears And eyes; they dodge and bounce, submerge and rise And still have time to care for us as if we suffered From the blind insouciance of youth. They grow, we age; There is a cool revision of the previous peacetime truth. Our greatest loss is fun. No pubs, no clubs, no foreign trips, Or dining out or Morris Dancing. No Wigmore Hall, No culture walks or learned talks on Caesar's Gaul. No summer operas with picnics stolen from the rain, No raucous multi generation feasts, indulgent shopping trips Or cacophonic music making. The car may never start again.

This is an age of life imported by a bullying star. In facing its constraints our chosen stratagem Is to revert to student domesticity and be an Item. Though quite unarguably two we trade as one, And armed with just the lightly anchored confidence Of youth we can ignore the frowns and insolence of all Our various incarcerators and live each day Precisely as it comes.
