

Avon Dassett Parish Council

The last meeting took place by videoconference on 1st February.

Parish Plan: Sarah Richardson has volunteered to lead the preparation of a Parish Plan and reported that she had spoken to Stratford District Council about the need for a Neighbourhood Plan. As Avon Dassett is not a Service Village and categorised as 'Any Other Settlement' it had been agreed that putting in place a Parish Plan was the most appropriate way forward for the village. The existing Plan was produced in 2007 and will require review and updating using resident surveys to gather data. It is hoped that a cross section of the community will assist with conducting the survey, particularly to gain the input from younger members of the community.

Annual Assembly/Parish Meeting: Following the last Parish Assembly it was agreed that the 2021 meeting should be held early in the Parish Council's year and with more publicity aimed at getting more public participation. Sarah Richardson offered to take a lead role in supporting the organisation of the meeting.

Fox Hunting: It was agreed that, following complaints from residents and discussions with Hornton Parish Council, it was agreed that the Clerk would send a letter to the Masters of the Hunt seeking the same arrangements as are in place with Hornton.

Playground: A contract has been placed with Wicksteed for the repairs to playground equipment. The gates have been repaired but it was noted that the ground under both gates is muddy and slippery.

St John's Churchyard: Work to clear the brambles has been completed. Stratford District Council has transferred responsibility for maintaining the churchyard to the Parish Council together with the relevant budget to cover the additional costs. The work to repoint the wall has been delayed.

Roads and Drains: The Highways Authority closed Church Hill to undertake repairs on 15th February. However, the closure notice allows further closures to take place over the next year if further work becomes necessary. Highways have been asked to survey the damage to the verge at the end of Park Close and propose a permanent solution, possibly widening the entrance. The damage to the verges on the Farnborough road has been reported to Highways.

Reading Room: The Reading Room remains closed until Government restrictions are lifted. Tidying up work has been completed and surplus books have been donated to charity.

2021 Census: Census Day is Sunday 21st March and it will go ahead despite Covid-19 restrictions. Although the Census will be conducted on-line, there will be paper copies available for those without internet access.

Coronavirus Volunteer Group: The helpline is still available and residents can make requests for help with items such as the collection of prescriptions. Cakes are being produced by volunteers and delivered to NHS sites. *Continued Overleaf*

Volunteers are also collecting and delivering pizzas from The Yew Tree to those self-isolating in the village. Volunteers are also being sought to help with the vaccination drive and anyone interested in being involved should contact Liz Hirst, Trevor or Michele Gill. The phone contract will be renewed to keep the line available as required.

Footpaths: The footpath on Church Hill is slippery due to wet leaves and overgrown vegetation. Volunteers will be sought to help to clear the footpath, subject to a risk assessment and compliance with Covid-19 restrictions. Following reports of stiles requiring repair or replacement, it was agreed to undertake a survey of all stiles and bridges and identify the landowners or their agents. It was also noted the Fenny Compton Footpaths Group is very active and successful in maintain footpaths and it was agreed to contact them and learn from their experience. It was also noted that landowners need to give permission before any repairs can be undertaken on their private land.

Superfast Broadband: Residents have reported poor performance issues with Broadband in the village. Anyone experiencing problems with the quality or speed of the service should report this to Trevor Gill, who will liaise on behalf of the village with the BT Broadband team. *See also separate article on improving Broadband connectivity.*

Projects and Grants: Nature Reserve: No news following our grant application. **St John's Church:** Project ongoing, A business case was approved by the Parish Council as was a draft letter to the Churches Conservation Trust seeking permission for the works to go ahead. **War Memorial:** A business case was approved by the Parish Council and a quotation for the work has been received. A grant application will be submitted to fund relaying the slabs around the War Memorial and repointing the exterior wall.

Elections: Councillor Feilding reported that the elections on Thursday 6th May would go ahead but that The Reading Room had been deemed to be an unsuitable venue for a Polling Station as it had only a single entrance and exit door. An alternative venue was being considered in Warmington. Following a suggestion that The Yew Tree may be a suitable local venue contact was made with Stratford District Council to explore the possibility.

IMPROVING INTERNET CONNECTIONS

With so many people working from home, some households are noticing poor internet speeds. These are a few things that you could do that might help to improve connectivity:

First thing; check your router is plugged in with an ADSL filter (the white box that comes out of your phone socket – see picture) and that all other phone sockets in the house also have filters on them.



Make sure that you do not have a DECT (cordless) phone right next to your router as this can cause interference with the Wi-Fi signal.

The next step is to test the internet speed. The best way to do this is to plug in a computer directly into your router (an ethernet cable is best but if not, you can use a USB port) and run a speed test (eg speedtest.net). Run the test with all other devices switched off including Wi-Fi on mobile phones. This will then give you an accurate internet speed. The speed that you are receiving will be affected by your area, the type of internet you have and the distance of your property from the BT cabinet. Remember plug your device into the router directly to get the best performance reading.

If you are in the range of the speed you should be getting, the issue is not broadband, but it is something local to your property. If the speed is lower than your contract, then contact your broadband provider

With residential lines, the internet speed is restricted by the number of concurrent users. Service providers offer speeds using a calculation of a ratio of 50:1, but you are likely to experience slowness of internet at peak times of the day or when there are large numbers of users of the same broadband line.

A frequent problem is that the Wi-Fi signal will not reach all areas in a property or, despite showing that there is a full signal, pages take time to open. This can be caused by the device that you are using or how many devices you have connected to your router. On all connected devices, check that all your background apps and pages not being used are closed down as they all use some internet and processor time which, when added up, can make the internet performance look slow when, in fact, it is the user not closing unused apps and pages on their device.

If you are finding areas where the Wi-Fi cannot reach, you can buy extenders, access points and better routers. But in this case, it is best to get expert advice, otherwise, you may spend time and money on buying equipment that will not resolve your issue.

NAPTON AND FENNY COMPTON WARD STRATFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

Covid-19: Infection rates here (as of mid-February), and more widely in Stratford district, have fallen to levels last seen before Christmas. Warwickshire reflects the UK average and Stratford District below average at 113 per 100,000 population. With the exception of Rugby, nearby local districts are below average as well.

As at Friday 12th February 183,328 doses of vaccine have been administered in Coventry and Warwickshire, with: 92.6% of over 80s vaccinated; 98.6% of 75-79 vaccinated & 81.6% of 70-74 vaccinated. As well as the Southam clinic, a mass vaccination centre is now operating at the NAC at Stoneleigh.

HS2: In response to my representations, I have received a number of apologies from HS2 about the disruption to roads around Harbury, Deppers and Bascote. Road closure dates have been overrun and the continuing theme is one of putting right defects from previous works. Unfortunately, this has coincided with repetitive flooding problems on the A425 at Shuckburgh. Although many of us are not travelling during lockdown, for those that have been making essential journeys through and around Southam, it may have felt impossible to get anywhere. I am pressing for a long-term solution to the Shuckburgh flooding problem. In coming weeks and months there are two bridges to be constructed where HS2 crosses the Banbury and Kineton Roads to the south of Southam. The intention is a combination of traffic lights, reconfigured roadways, and short night time closures with the bridges being constructed next to the highway and then put in place.

Elections: The Government has said that County Council and Police and Crime Commissioner elections will go ahead on Thursday 6th May. There is considerable concern about the ability to hold the poll in a safe way while Covid-19 infections are at significant level. Some of us thought that a short delay until the summer would allow the virus levels to fall, and July has been spoken of. Stratford District Council has found that 15 polling stations are unsafe in terms of social distancing so some electors will have to vote elsewhere. Locally, Wormleighton residents are to be asked to travel to Fenny Compton or to vote by post. There are other effects too – a Ministerial ruling says leaflets can now only be delivered by 'paid for' delivery which favours candidates with strong financial backing. Many temporary polling staff have said they are unhappy with the risk and will not make themselves available. The Government response is to provide an extra £31m across all Councils to compensate for difficulties in running the elections during the pandemic, and although they recognise polling staff vulnerability is a key issue they will not prioritise them for vaccination.

District Council Merger: Stratford and Warwick Districts are planning to merge. This is forecast to save £4.5m a year across both Councils and the Government has signalled a desire for bigger Councils. There is already some joint working going on, particularly in planning policy, but a merger is a big step, and we need to make sure that local Government does not 'move further away' from the residents they serve.

The ambition is that that the merger is achieved by 2024. Between then and now there is much investigation to be done, and after all that the Government could refuse the merger as proposed by the Councils.

Dog Fouling: There has been a marked increase in dog fouling across the district, as well as locally. I have worked with Council officers and the Parish Council on signage, but ultimately this is irresponsible behaviour of a few dog owners, against whom the council will take legal action if there is a case. LETTER FROM THE VICARAGE

There are times in our lives when we look around and wonder, "Is this all there is?" Sometimes it is a passing question, at other times it lingers. We look at our life, our circumstances, and we want more. Is that how it feels right now? A restlessness, a desire for something more, something different. We often look at our circumstances as a picture. If it is pretty, pleasing, and shows us what we want to see then God is good, and life is as it should be. When we do not see what we want we look for a new picture. The restless searching, the longing for more, the desire for meaning, are not, however, usually answered by changed circumstances. Although they may help. It is not about the circumstances of life. It is about us. The answer is found within.

We do not need to see new things. We need to see the same old things with new eyes. We do not need to hear a different voice. We need to hear the same old voice with different ears. We do not need to escape the circumstances of our life. We need to be more fully present to those circumstances. These are the transfiguring moments when the picture of our life becomes a window into a new world, new opportunities.

Most of us, I think, seek God in the circumstances of life. We want God to show up, be present, change something, make it better. But then there is the God beyond the circumstances. Jesus - God with us - who walks beside us and at times often carries us. Here the pictures of life's circumstances become windows, by which we move into the depths of God's life, light, and love. Windows through which we step into a new world, a new way of seeing, hearing, and being. Read Mark 9:2-9. Peter, James, and John suddenly see Jesus as he had always been. Not just a man they followed who did miracles, told powerful stories and about whom people talked, but Jesus the divine Son of God. God who is beyond the man and the circumstances. Jesus - God incarnate - God with us. But this change, or transfiguration, is as much about them as it is Jesus.

Whenever our picture of life's circumstances becomes a window into new life we are transfigured. The view carries us, it is spectacular - it lifts us. We do not have to climb mountains to get that. Circumstances have not changed; we have and that seems to change everything. We all have times when we see life with new eyes, hear with different ears, and discover a window into another world and another way of being. Faith is one of those moments. Faith is a mystery we seem to spend all our time trying to explain, but there is part of all that, that should and must remain a mystery. Part of faith is believing in the inexplicable, in marvelling at the mystery. Faith is not just believing it is knowing. Transfiguring moments change, sustain, prepare, encourage and guide us into the future regardless of the circumstances we face. Every picture of life is an open window that says, "No, this is not all there is." Open that window and be transfigured!





FENNY COMPTON WATER COMPANY

Under the roads of Fenny Compton is a secret that many residents will not be aware of – the pipes of the Fenny Compton Water Company. They run from a covered spring up

in the hills, down Avon Dassett Road then extend as far as Northend Road and just beyond the Co-op.

The Water Company was formed in 1866 by the local Rector, Charles Abel Heurtley, after the connection between water supply and sewerage was understood and, today, we deliver pure, clean water to about 40 houses and 6 businesses. Up until about 6 years ago the water was untreated, straight from the spring but we have had to modernise to meet current legislation; we filter the water twice then use ultraviolet treatment to destroy any contamination. The water is tested by an independent laboratory at least twice a year. We pass with



flying colours and we are legally obliged to share the test results with Environmental Health. When Covid-19 is just a bad memory we will be having an open day to show off what we do.

The Water Company is one of the oldest companies in the country and possibly the oldest public water company in the world and yet few people have heard of us or know what we do. To fix this we are going to launch a website. This is a plea - if you can supply any stories, anecdotes, photos, or memories of the Water Company please send them to me and we will consider using them. We have the Company's records such as meeting minutes, correspondence, and accounts but if you can supply anything else it would be much appreciated.

ELECTRONIC COMPUTING MACHINE AT THE WHARF

In 1947 at Birkbeck College, London, it was decided to construct an electronic computing machine. Versions of such machines had been built during the 1939-1945 war, but these were either of such a size as to be unavailable to anyone other than a large government department, or alternatively, were of the comparatively simple type required to aim and fire an anti-aircraft gun, or of the sort in a radar installation to track enemy planes which were approaching our coasts.

The new type of computing machine which emerged at the conclusion of hostilities was one which, to quote the popular press, was capable of exercising a certain amount of independent judgement. Actually, the independent judgement exerted by any computing machine is extremely small and is, in fact, limited to the ability to determine whether a number which it has calculated is positive or negative. It can be shown that a machine which can do this, and which can follow one of two courses of action, according to the results of such a discrimination, can, in fact, perform any of the operations of logic which can be conceived. It is also possible to make such a machine perform such apparently complicated operations as the playing of a game of chess or draughts, or of translating from one language into another.

Although the University of London, as personified by Birkbeck College, was willing for such a machine to be constructed, in 1947 it was extremely difficult to obtain a suitable building in London. The University had provided funds for such a building to be constructed but with the usual hold-ups associated with builders, it appeared unlikely that any accommodation would be forthcoming until about 1950.

The then Master of Birkbeck College, Professor Gordon Jackson, in a conversation with Professor Bernal and Dr Booth, came to the conclusion that it might be feasible to make a start on the project in some of the rather extensive outbuildings which were available at the Wharf, Fenny Compton, where Dr Booth was living. And in this manner, it came about that the College provided an adequate laboratory and workshop in which the construction of a computing machine could be started.

A number of assistants had a part in the building of this machine, most of whom will be quite unknown in Fenny Compton. One of the earliest, however, and one who is, we are pleased to say, still with us was Mr Charles Newman, who is employed as a mechanical engineer and who was responsible, with a succession of laboratory assistants, for the construction, not only of the electronic chassis, which we eventually wired into the machine, but, also of the intricate drum storage device, which forms the basis of the machine memory.

The machine was completed in 1950. It was operated for a few weeks in Fenny Compton and then moved to the Computational Laboratory in Torrington Square, London, which by that time had been completed. The machine has not been operated for a number of years and has performed a large number of calculations which range from the location of the positions of atoms in crystalline materials to the tracing of the paths of electrons through a magnetic lens system, or in popular parlance, the way in which an electronic beam moves in order to produce a television picture.

Recent work has included the translation of French sentences into English, and also the transcription of Standard English into Braille for the Blind.

A further machine has since been constructed in the laboratories at Fenny Compton; this is known as NAC or magnetic automatic calculator. It is a much smaller machine than the earlier one but is equally fast and equally flexible. It shows the progress that has been made in machine design over the years which followed the production of our original model. Larger versions of the original model have been produced on a commercial basis by the British Tabulating Machine Company, Letchworth, and a number of these are now in operation in various parts of the country.

CARE COMPANION

Care Companion is a website that has been developed to support unpaid family carers. It is part of the support package offered to Warwickshire carers. The site has been created by a team of researchers at Warwick Medical School guided a panel of people with many years of hands-on caring experience.

Imagine a family member or close friend has just received a life-changing diagnosis.

Care Companion
FOR CARERS & THE CARED FOR

At the consultation it is difficult to take in everything and it is likely you will not remember half of what was said. You may be given very little information. This happened to me when my husband was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease.

Where do you start? If you go to a search engine, such as Google, you can just go round in circles. How do you know what to look for or whether the information is trustworthy?

Care Companion is a secure site offering a unique, personalised experience for carers looking for additional help, advice, and support. Carers are invited to register with the site and complete a questionnaire asking for information about the condition/s of the person they care for. When they then search for information, the search returns resources unique to them. It is possible to use the site without registering but this is not recommended as the user will not gain the most benefit from the personalisation.

The site has four main modules. There are over 1000 entries in the carefully curated resources library and more are continually being added. The diary is for appointments and follow-up information or can be used as a journal. The address book keeps details of useful contacts in one place. Finally, a mood monitor helps the user be aware of their moods and will offer suggestions for actions, especially if low moods are continually recorded.

Take a look at Care Companion, by going to www.carecompanion.org.uk. To ensure Care Companion is serving the needs of carers effectively, a research study, funded by the National Institute for Health Research, is being carried out. It is an opportunity for users to pass on their thoughts about the effectiveness of the site. It does not matter how much carers have used the site; their views are important. The team are looking for carers willing to take part in a 20–30-minute interview, by phone or video link, at a time convenient to themselves. Please come alone if you can and be mindful that you may need to wait a little longer than normal to be seen as the rooms are cleaned between patients to keep you safe.

As ever, we remain appreciative of your support during these difficult times. We know it cannot be easy queuing outside, particularly in the recent chilly weather. Let us hope some much needed spring sunshine is around the corner!

Gay Mathie formerly Turner 1945-2021

As many of you will know by now Gay Mathie sadly lost her fight with cancer on January 14th 2021.

Over the 40 years or so Gay lived in Fenny Compton she was involved in many things but probably the one she will be remembered for the most is her fundraising for Cancer Research UK.

After losing her Mother Dorothy to cancer, a year later in 1988, Gay started the Fenny Compton Committee for Cancer Research UK in her memory.

The Christmas Fayre has become an annual event in the village that so many of us look forward to but it was a Ploughman's lunch at Ducketts Cottage that started what became 30 years of fundraising for Gay.

There were several Coffee Mornings and Valuation Evenings along the way, even making the local radio station Coventry and Warwickshire with a 12-hour Hairdressing Marathon!

Along with several helpers, Gay had the privilege of being invited to Cancer Research Institute Laboratories at Birmingham University to see just what the money being raised was being used for.

After reaching 20 years of fundraising, Gay arranged a cheese and wine evening to thank the many people who had helped and supported her over the years to raise approximately £35,000 at that point in time. This in turn was recognised with a talk from Professor Paul Moss from the Cancer Research Institute for Cancer Studies at Birmingham University to round off the evening.

To celebrate 25 years of fundraising, with the kind permission of Nigel and Daphne Leck at The Merrie Lion we introduced The Tree for Life.

The record amount raised at any one event was in excess of £3,000 namely a Christmas Fayre and although it is an exceptional amount for one afternoon in our Village Hall, for Gay it involved weeks and months of detailed planning and hard work.

Unfortunately, only days before the last Christmas Fayre organised by Gay, she started investigations into what was diagnosed as breast cancer just one week later.

After 30 years the total amount raised exceeded £58,000, in fact we believe it is possibly nearer to £60,000 but sadly would need our dear friend Gay to confirm this! What an amazing achievement and legacy to leave behind.

Gay's only wish would have been to meet her new grandson, due on 9th February; sadly it was not to be.


However, I am pleased to announce baby Dominic arrived safely, only a little late, on 14th February 2021 and Grandma Gay very much approved of Dominic's name.


